BIGGER BUDGET NEEDED




Adult education is tackling many of Europe's most pressing challenges but the budget share remains unchanged. To fully have an impact, adult education needs more funding.

Adult education in the new programme is supposed to focus (exclusively) on low qualified people. Yet adult education is not only a tool to fill the gaps from the formal education system but a means for active citizenship, better health and wellbeing at different stages of adults' lives.


The European Commission proposes to double the overall budget. Yet the share for adult education remains the same.
