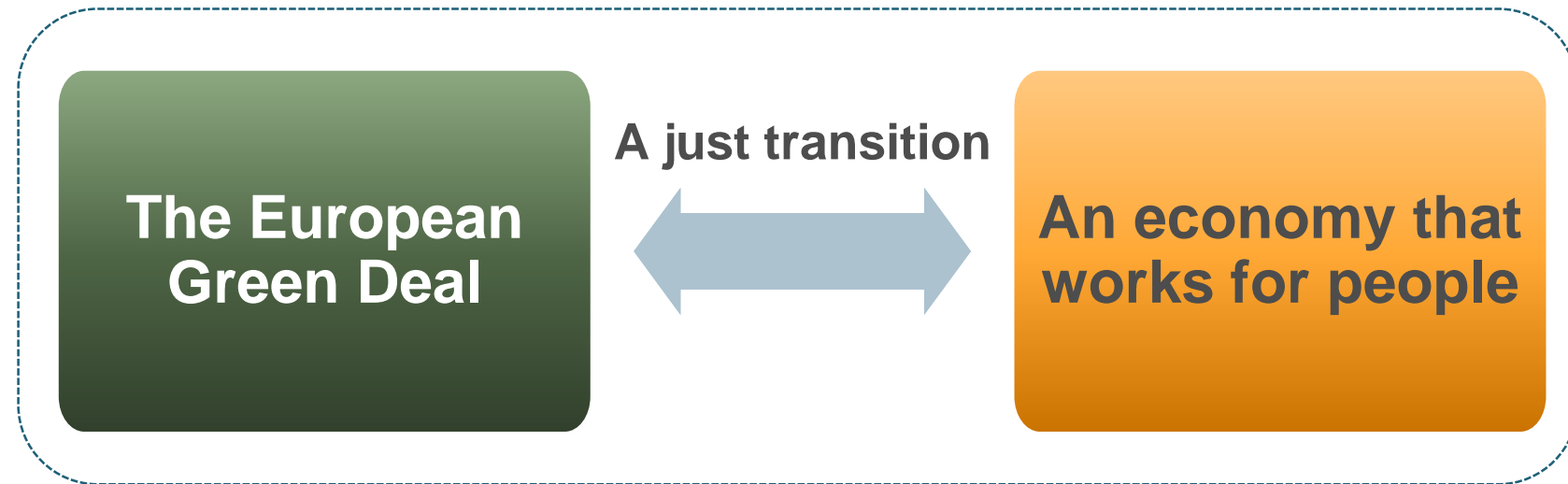

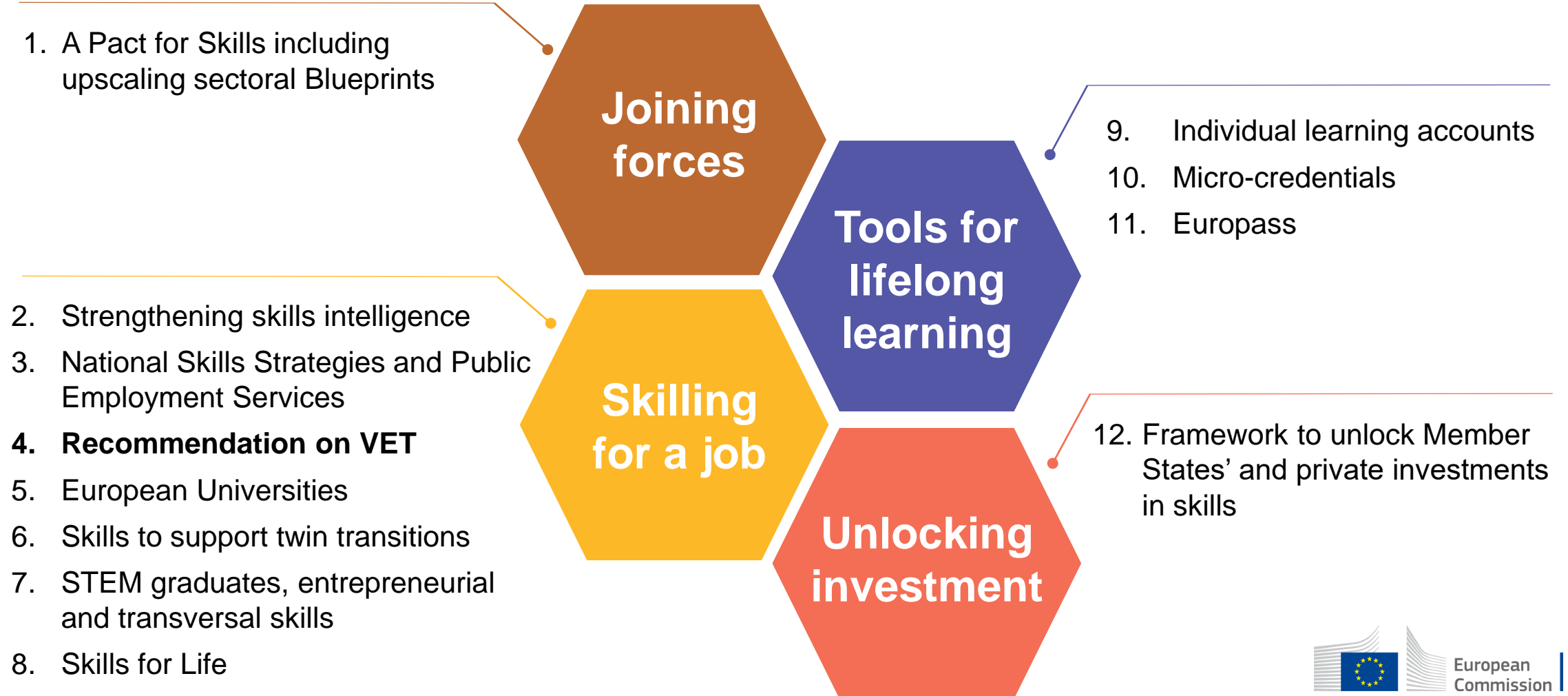

Skills Agenda - BUILDING BLOCKS



Ambitious objectives for adult upskilling

Indicators (in %)	Objectives for 2025	Current level (latest year available)	Increase (in %)
Participation of adults aged 25-64 in learning during the last 12 months ⁵⁸	50%	38% (2016)	+32%
Participation of low-qualified adults 25-64 in learning during the last 12 months ⁵⁹	30%	18% (2016)	+67%
Share of unemployed adults aged 25-64 with a recent learning experience ⁶⁰	20%	11% (2019)	+82%
Share of adults aged 16-74 having at least basic digital skills ⁶¹	70%	56% (2019)	+25%

Implications for Upskilling Pathways

- **Skills for Life - More needs to be done to support people to acquire these skills, and to reinforce Upskilling Pathways**
- **By 2025, 14 million adults with low qualifications participating in learning every year; 230 million adults should have at least basic digital skills**
- **Reflecting on the lessons learnt from the COVID-19 crisis and build on the first Digital Education Action Plan of 2018. Part of the Recovery Plan of the Commission.**
- **Digital Education Action Plan - wider scope, expanding beyond formal education to non-formal and lifelong learning**
- **Focus on:**
 - 1) Digital capacity building of institutions (e.g. schools, VET centres, adult education institutions)**
 - 2) Digital competences (learners, teachers, trainers educational staff in school, VET, adult and higher education)**
