



## The New European Agenda for Adult Learning (NEAAL)


The <u>NEAAL</u> is the European Union's key strategy until 2030 to promote adult learning and education (ALE) in Europe. Find out what it does for increasing participation in ALE and promoting a holistic understanding of learning in adulthood!



The NEAAL recognises the role of ALE for providing all the necessary knowledge, skills and competences to **create an inclusive**, **sustainable**, **socially just and more resilient Europe**. It also refers to how ALE can promote the digital and green transitions, and how ALE can contribute positively to challenges such as climate change, demographic change, health, etc.

It stresses that there is a need to raise greater awareness among the population of the importance and benefits of participation in lifelong learning, calling for new approaches to facilitate the participation of adults, including those not inclined to attend learning activities and the 65+ age group, in adult learning in order to support their full integration and participation in society.







Underlining that ALE enhances life and work opportunities for all adults, and that it contributes to active citizenship and community learning, it calls for a holistic approach including inter-sectoral and multistakeholder collaboration, and effective coordination at European, national, regional and local levels, respecting the diverse models of adult learning in the European Union.

It focuses on **5 priority areas**:

- 1. Governance of ALE
- 2. Supply and take-up of lifelong learning opportunities
- 3. Accessibility and flexibility
- 4. Quality, equity, inclusion and success in adult learning
- 5.Green and digital transitions





It proposes 2 objectives for participation in ALE:

- At least 47 % of adults aged 25-64 should have participated in learning during the last 12 months, by 2025
- At least 60 % of adults aged 25-64 should have participated in learning during the last 12 months, by 2030
